Every chess player knows that the ability to make appropriate plans produces a more purposeful, effective and stronger player. But finding the right plan requires the correct evaluation of the position, which can be done only with knowledge and understanding of the principles of chess strategy.

This practical guide will enable the tournament player to recognize the key strategic features of a position, such as advantages in time or space; strengths and weaknesses of the respective pawn formations; mobility, vulnerability, co-ordination and comparative values of individual pieces.

Separate chapters are dedicated to the opening, middlegame and ending. The significance of various kinds of exchanges and positional sacrifices is also detailed, and special attention is paid to the need for flexibility and versatility of planning.

The late Eduard Gufeld was a leading Soviet grandmaster who moved to the US where he gained a reputation as an enthusiastic teacher and promoter of chess. He was a prolific chess writer, noted for his witty yet instructive approach. His many published chess books include Exploiting Small Advantages, Ultimate Dragon Volumes One and Two, and Chess: The Search for Mona Lisa.

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
